Historic Motorama 2002 by Jerry Craig

Next to the theatre at the Corvette Museum is a picture taken in 2002 of one of each year Corvettes from 1953 to 2003. General Motors wished to commemorate the 50 years of Corvette by assembling a group of one Corvette from each year of production. The group would drive from Flint Michigan to Detroit to St. Louis to Bowling Green, all cities where Corvettes were designed or made. On the road for five days, the group displayed at car shows, parks, dealers and vendors along the way. Many magazine articles.

Arriving at the Kentucky border the group was escorted to Bowling Green by the Kentucky State Patrol. It was a wild flat-out ride. At the Museum, a large crowd welcomed the travelers. Later that day the group assembled for a drive through the middle of the Corvette factory! Production stopped and employees cheered. Mid-year Corvettes did burn outs on the factory floor.

Now, the rest of the story. The picture was taken on Kiener Plaza with the Arch in the background. Arriving in St. Louis, the group was met with the best parking lot party ever with free beer and lots of snacks provided by local Corvette Clubs. Judy and Marty Dooley were instrumental in the coordination. Later that evening the Mayor's office called Marty with a major problem. It seems there was no way to get the Corvettes up on the Plaza. Curbs are 11 inches high. Marty called Jeff Craig and the two put in all-nighters to build ramps to get the Vettes up to and off the Plaza safely. A gray day cleared and an awesome picture was taken.

St Louis Corvette Club members Sharon and Carl Ballinger and Armynta and Jerry Craig made the trip. It was an amazing experience to see the group on the road. Truckers tooted.

We met Sharon and Jim Love from Indiana. Actually we met Sharon. Then a few days later we met Jim. Seems he was always out cleaning his wheels. If you've ever seen his wheels, you know why.

Porsche and Corvette

Interesting article from Road and Track

Over its lifetime, the Porsche 928 was referred to as "Germany's Corvette," and for good reason. Like the Corvette, the 928 was a V8-powered, front-engine, rear-drive coupe designed to cover long distances at high speeds. The two cars don't have much else in common, except for one man: Tony Lapine.



Latvian designer Anatole "Tony" Lapine started his career at GM in 1951, in the height of the Bill Mitchell years. While there, he frequently collaborated with Larry Shinoda, who shaped the second-generation Corvette, Lapine served as the studio engineer for the 1963 Corvette Sting Ray.

After the Sting Ray, Lapine worked on a number of concept cars with legendary Chevy engineer Zora-Arkus Duntov, including two mid-engine CERV Corvette prototypes. After the CERV II, Lapine was transferred to GM's Opel Division in Germany, where he stayed for a few years before being poached by Porsche in 1969.

Lapine's arrival at Porsche came just a few years before the company embarked on a plan to replace the aging 911 with two new models, the 924 and 928. Lapine led the design of both vehicles, the 924, which was styled by Harm Lagaay, and the 928, styled by Wolfgang Möbius.

When the 928 debuted in 1977, it looked like nothing Porsche had ever done before. The always-excellent *Ate Up With Motor* reports that Lapine and Möbius insisted the 928 should look provocative, and it took a while for Porsche executives to come around to its looks. The 928 was never successful enough to replace the 911, though it stuck around until 1995 since Porsche didn't have the capital to develop an all-new car.

The Sting Ray is the quintessential 1960s American sports car design, and few cars that evoke the late-1970s better than the 928. Both designs reflect their times, but have aged quite gracefully, a credit to Lapine.

Lapine passed away in 2012 at the age of 81. His isn't a household name, even among car enthusiasts, but he had a hand in shaping some of the most important sports cars of all time.


